What Is Korlym® (mifepristone) 300 mg Tablets?

Korlym is a prescription medicine used to treat high blood sugar (hyperglycemia) caused by high cortisol levels in the blood (hypercortisolism) in adults with endogenous Cushing syndrome who have type 2 diabetes mellitus or glucose intolerance and who cannot have surgery or for whom surgery has failed. **Korlym** is not for people who have type 2 diabetes mellitus not caused by Cushing syndrome.

Most Important Information About Korlym

Korlym should never be taken by women who are pregnant or who might become pregnant. Taking Korlym during pregnancy will result in the loss of a pregnancy. A pregnancy test is required before starting Korlym or if treatment is interrupted for more than 14 days. Talk with your doctor about how to prevent pregnancy.

WHAT IS KORLYM?



Korlym is a prescription medicine used to treat high blood sugar caused by endogenous (inside the body) Cushing syndrome (also known as hypercortisolism). It works to reduce the negative effects of excess cortisol activity in your body.

Living with Cushing syndrome can feel overwhelming.

But learning as much as you can about treatment options, like **Korlym**, can help change that.

IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION (CONT.)

Tell your doctor and pharmacist about all the medicines you take, including prescription and over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements. **Korlym** and certain other medicines, may affect each other or may cause side effects.

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CORTISOL AND CUSHING SYNDROME

Endogenous Cushing syndrome occurs when a nodule on the pituitary gland, adrenal glands, or elsewhere in the body causes the production of too much cortisol (also known as the "stress hormone"). This increase in cortisol can lead to a variety of health issues, like:

High blood sugar

Weight gain

Hypertension

Infection

Cardiovascular disease



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HOW KORLYM MAY HELP

Korlym was studied in a clinical trial* of 50 adults with endogenous Cushing syndrome who had type 2 diabetes mellitus or glucose intolerance and who could not have surgery or for whom surgery had failed. In the trial:



3 out of 5 people had **improved blood sugars**



1 out of 2 people had less need for antidiabetic medicine (like insulin)



1 out of 2 people experienced improved mood and focus[†]



1 out of 2 people lost weight[†]

*Results are from an open-label study of **Korlym**. Assessment was based on 8 broad categories: glucose control, lipids, blood pressure, body composition, clinical appearance, strength, psychiatric symptoms, and quality of life.

Do not take **Korlym** if:


- you are taking certain medications for high cholesterol, such as simvastatin (e.g., Zocor®)

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HOW KORLYM WORKS

Korlym works to reduce the negative effects of excess cortisol activity in the body by competing with cortisol at the cellular level.

WHAT TO FXPFCT WHEN **STARTING KORLYM**

As you and your doctor decide if **Korlym** is right for you, here are some important things to know about taking it.

Once-daily oral dosing

Korlym should be:





Taken once per day

Swallowed whole





Taken with a meal

Not split, chewed, or crushed

When starting treatment, your doctor will work with you to find the right dose of **Korlym** to help you meet your treatment goals.

Routine blood work

Before starting and while taking **Korlym**, you need to have blood work done to check your potassium levels. This is important because some people may experience lower than normal potassium levels while on **Korlym**.

Potassium levels should be checked:

Before starting treatment

1-2 weeks after your first dose

1-2 weeks after a dose increase

Periodically throughout treatment

Symptoms of low potassium levels include:

- Muscle weakness, aches, or cramps
- Abnormal or irregular heartbeat (palpitations)
- Constipation
- Swelling of your hands or feet (edema)

Communicating with your doctor

Be sure to bring along a list of medicines you are currently taking. This includes prescriptions, over-the-counter medicines, vitamins, and herbal supplements.

Also tell your doctor about any medical conditions you have or have had, including if you are pregnant. You should not take Korlym if you are pregnant or might become pregnant.

INDICATIONS AND IMPORTANT SAFETY INFORMATION

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Do not take **Korlym** if:

- you are taking certain medications for high cholesterol, such as simvastatin (e.g., Zocor*) or lovastatin (e.g., Mevacor*), as Korlym may cause a dangerous increase in the level of these medications in the blood
- you take corticosteroid medications like prednisone to treat a serious medical condition
- you have experienced unexplained vaginal bleeding, changes in the cells lining your uterus (endometrial hyperplasia), or cancer of the lining of your uterus (endometrial cancer)

What Are the Possible Side Effects of Korlym?

Patients taking **Korlym** should be monitored for side effects. Potential serious side effects include signs of adrenal insufficiency, low potassium levels, changes to the lining of the uterus, vaginal bleeding, and problems with the electrical system of the heart.

The most common side effects of **Korlym** include nausea, fatigue, headache, low potassium in the blood, pain in arms and legs (arthralgia), vomiting, swelling of arms and legs (peripheral edema), high blood pressure, dizziness, decreased appetite, and thickening of the lining of the uterus (endometrial hypertrophy).

Tell your doctor if you have any side effect that bothers you or that does not go away.

These are not all of the possible side effects of **Korlym**. For more information, ask your doctor or pharmacist. For medical advice about side effects, call your doctor.

Before taking Korlym, talk to your doctor if you are breastfeeding or plan to breastfeed.
